New Residential Energy Program Coming to Field Regina Northrop!

Learn how to reduce your energy use and save money! The FRNNG has teamed up with the Center for Energy and Environment, CenterPoint Energy and Xcel Energy to offer Field Regina Northrop homeowners Community Energy Services, CES, a full service residential energy program.

The program will not only provide you with information about reducing your energy use by installing low-cost/no-cost measures in your home, but it will also provide you with the tools and financing necessary if you are ready to make larger investments such as insulation, sealing bypasses and installing new windows.

Community Energy Services Provides:

- **Free** educational workshops to teach homeowners how to lower their energy use and save money;
- Materials which may include: low flow showerheads, setback thermostats, compact fluorescent light bulbs, gasket seals, door sweeps, faucet aerators, pipe insulation and attic hatch weather-striping to help participants save now;

- Customized home energy visits from qualified professionals who will identify additional ways for residents to save in their homes, including a blower door test. Up to \$400 in services and materials for a co-pay of only \$20;

- Personalized energy use inventory for the last 12 months and feedback for the next 12 months to show the homeowner how these low-cost/no-cost measures resulted in decreased energy use, also allowing participants to compare their energy use to that of their neighbors also participating in the program (confidentially of course);

- Information on financing, incentives, stimulus funding and rebates for those wishing to complete larger projects such as insulation or a furnace replacement.

Council Members focus on next year's budget

In August Mayor RT Rybak delivered his proposed 2010 budget to the City Council. The City Council is now considering the Mayor's proposal in a series of budget hearings before the Council's Ways and Means Committee. The City Council is holding a public hearing to give folks the opportunity to provide their input before it approves the final 2010 budget in December.

The Mayor's proposed City budget for 2010 focuses on jobs, while preserving public safety gains and continuing to invest in infrastructure.

It includes expanding a program that offers low interest loans and financing tools to small businesses, and \$1.2 million to help more people find and get jobs through the City's Workforce Centers.

Minneapolis is facing a number of serious fiscal challenges that affect the City's bottom line. This includes State cuts to Minneapolis of more than \$40 million during 2009-2010 and escalating health care and pension costs. To balance the budget, the Mayor's proposal includes a mix of budget cuts, reforms and a new revenue policy.

Update from Cedar Avenue United



August was a great month for Cedar Avenue United – we were able to get parking lanes striped on Cedar Avenue between 38th Street and 46th Street, thanks to Jim Grube in the Hennepin County Public Works department.

We met with Hennepin County Commissioner Peter McLaughlin on August 17th and discussed the most pressing issues identified with Cedar Avenue (speeding, noise pollution, vibration and air pollution). We will continue an on-going dialog with Commissioner McLaughlin to keep our issues in the fore-front with the County.

On September 19th, we worked in conjunction with the Standish Ericsson Neighborhood Association (SENA) and the City of Minneapolis' Great Streets program to clean up the corner of Cedar Avenue and 42nd Street. Our group picked up litter, mowed and pulled weeds, pruned wayward tree limbs and generally spiffed up the corner. After that, there was a BBQ to celebrate the completion of the line striping project, and our hard work to date on Cedar Avenue.

Watch for our next traffic-calming project: Burma Shave - inspired signs along Cedar Avenue. An example of signs to come:

FRNNG Awarded \$50,000 Grant for Business Facade Improvement Program

Field Regina Northrop Neighborhood Group (FRNNG) and South Chicago Avenue Business Alliance (SCABA) have been awarded a \$50,000 grant from the City of Minneapolis Great Streets Facade Improvement Program, providing matching funds for improvements to neighborhood businesses.

Who can apply for a matching grant?

- Building owners and commercial tenants (with property owner's approval) can apply for a Great Streets Facade grant if:

- They are located within an eligible business districts *and*

- The facade improvements are for a commercial business or commercial building, meaning it has a retail or office use.

The five eligible business districts in the Field Regina Northrop Neighborhood Group (FRNNG) are:

- 42nd St. and Bloomington Ave.

Commercial Node,

- 42nd St. and Cedar Ave.

Commercial Node,

- 46th St. and Bloomington Ave.

Commercial Node,

- 48th St. and Chicago Ave.

Commercial Node,

- Cedar Ave and Minnehaha

Parkway Commercial Node.

Contact FRNNG for a map of these nodes.

For-profit and not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply, as long as the grant is used for a commercial building. Most commercial uses are retail and office, however other uses may qualify, such as day care centers. Uses that are religious in nature are not eligible.

How much are the matching grants?

One matching grant can reach up to a maximum of \$5,000 per business or building storefront. You can apply more than one grant, provided the cumulative total of all the grants awarded does not

exceed the maximum \$5,000 grant amount.

The five eligible business districts in FRNNG require a 1:2 match (1:1 match for 42nd and Bloomington). This means every grant dollar must be matched by two private dollars. In terms of percentages, the grant will pay for 33% of the total project costs, up to a maximum of \$5,000.

Park Board Pleased by Public Support for Independence but will not be on Fall Ballot

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) announced that the grassroots Citizens for Independent Parks campaign had collected 17,086 signatures in support of getting a City Charter amendment about the MPRB's independence on the ballot this November. Unfortunately for the MPRB, a Hennepin County judge ruled that a referendum to declare the MPRB a separate unit was unconstitutional and therefore it won't be on the fall ballot.

According to judge Cara Lee Neville, Minnesota state law only allows for the legislature to create separate units of government. The MPRB is currently a department of the City of Minneapolis.

MPRB supporters are concerned that the city council is trying to over-control MPRB and that there could be long-lasting negative effects. Their hope was to make MPRB an independent unit. That won't be happening, at least not this fall.

The MPRB manages 182 park properties totaling 6,400 acres of parkland. There are more than 18 million visits each year to the MPRB's local and regional parks that feature 49 recreation centers, 55 miles of parkways, 43 miles of paved walking paths, 43 miles of paved bike paths, 60 wading pools, 12

beaches, two water parks, 12 gardens, nine boat launches, five off-leash dog areas, seven golf courses, 23 outdoor ice rink locations and countless tennis courts, basketball courts and athletic fields for youth and adult sports.

Northrop School Site Proposal

On August 10, 2009, United Properties presented a proposal for the use of the Northrop School site for senior housing. The

need for senior housing will almost double in the next ten years so there is a need for acceptable housing in the Field Regina Northrop area as we are largely without at this point.

Some highlights of the proposal include that they don't plan to use the existing structure at all but may use some of the resources such as hardwood floors, etc. The proposal calls for a three story building consisting of about 90 units with an interior parking lot for visitors and underground parking available to residents. The entire property will be smoke free.

The timeline calls for it to take about 12 months to do the planning, engineering and getting city approval while trying to sell approximately 70% of the units. It could take over two years to sell all the units. Leveling of the current structure would happen during this 12 month period. New construction would take about 10 months.

It will be facilitated jointly by FRNNG and MPD to develop the annual neighborhood policing plans for the Field, Regina, and Northrop neighborhoods. This is your opportunity to share your input about crime and safety priorities for the next year. Please join us!

Are you a block club leader? Have you considered becoming a block club leader? Does your block need a block club leader? If you answered "yes" to any of these questions or if you would just like to know more about the role of block club leaders in our neighborhood, please come to the October Community and Safety meeting. It will be held on Tuesday, October 27 at McRae Park and is tentatively scheduled for 6-8 pm. This meeting will be focused on recruitment, roles and responsibilities, and appreciation of block club leaders. We will share strategies, discuss challenges, offer training, and celebrate success.

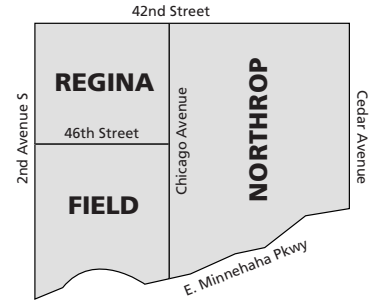
