

Planning Underway for Minnehaha Creek and Parkway

The Minneapolis Park & Recreation Board (MPRB) is starting a planning process that will create a new Minnehaha Parkway Regional Trail Master Plan. This plan will help guide projects along Minnehaha Creek. After completion of the master plan, the MPRB will be able to implement \$2.7 million in capital improvements based on this planning process. This work is also funded by the Parks and Trails Legacy Fund.

The MPRB is asking for community input at several stages along this process, and your voice can help guide ideas for where this money is spent along the creek. The first two public informal meetings were held on April 12 and 17, and more will be announced throughout the summer, with "Community involvement in refinement of designs" planned for July-September 2018 and a final document by the end of 2018.



When I look back on our neighborhood over the years, I think we've done a good job on improving our FRN community. Of course, there is still more good work that we can accomplish together, such as using our loan program to fix up housing (see page 4). The business community here can continue to evolve and prosper, with our retail and service pockets, such as at 47th and Cedar, and 48th and Chicago, as well as our other small businesses in the neighborhood. Our McRae Park building could benefit from some improvements, such as maybe air conditioning.

Of the years that I've enjoyed being our FRN community president, I think what I've enjoyed the most has been the opportunity to meet and get to know a lot of you, the people in our communities. I really tried to look out for the good of the whole, while knowing that I'm not going to be able to please everyone. We've talked about community-related issues such as bike and vehicle lanes co-existing, having a new coffee shop enter the area, the need for low-income housing options, about the potential block development where our Walgreens is now located and parking in the business area. These are all ongoing issues that still need to be addressed.

FRN, you have been and are a great community of people. You've undoubtedly given thousands of hours of your time as volunteers to our community and in many capacities through the FRN committees: Business, Communications, Community & Safety, Education, Greening, Housing, and Parks. You've also volunteered on the board of FRN and as neighborhood representatives. Thank you for your contributions. I would also like to thank our one FRN staff member, Stearline Rucker, for all the hard work she has done for our neighborhood.

Pepitos Renovation Underway

Pepitos restaurant and the Parkway Theater sold to new owners in February and renovations are well underway with a scheduled re-open date sometime in June 2018. The new owners are Ward Johnson and Eddie Landenberger, and both are longtime fans of Pepitos. Johnson, in particular, has a special connection to Pepitos. "My wife and I had our first date at Pepitos. And fittingly in 2001, it's where I proposed."

The restaurant's new tenants will be El Burrito Mercado, a fixture on St. Paul's West Side for 36 years. El Burrito Mercado is led and operated by Milissa Silva-Diaz together with her sister and niece, which makes it a 100%-women-owned Latina business. Fittingly, according to Silva-Diaz, the bar portion of the restaurant will carry a theme featuring prominent Latina entertainers, artists, and influential women. Like it's St. Paul counterpart, El Burrito Minneapolis will feature an award-winning menu of authentic Mexican cuisine, a take-out deli, as well as their popular tamale-making classes.

In addition to remodeling and updating the theater, Johnson and Landenberger are looking to put their take on programing for the Parkway Theater. Landenberger said the new programing might include, "...curated movie and speaker series, contemporary chamber music, and more." They are also looking into upgrading the projection system in the theater which currently can only screen movies on 35mm film which is a rare commodity in the age of digital projection.

Former owner Joe Minjares, for his part, is happy to be handing off the torch to people with deep connections to the neighborhood, and to his restaurant. "It's bittersweet to say goodbye," says Minjares. "But I feel like I'm leaving things in good hands, and there's a bit of serendipity to be handing over the reins of the restaurant to another family-owned Mexican restaurant with a long history in the Twin Cities." �

Annual SCABA Car Show Set for Sunday, June 10

Also as in other years, spectators will be admitted FREE to the show! Everyone is invited to stop by and "stroll through the past" while dreaming about the cars from yesteryear!

Mike Kmiecik, president of SCABA, welcomes everyone to this year's car show, which has become a true "summer neighborhood celebration." Kmiecik added that SCABA looks forward to receiving the support of the entire area to make the day a success. He also mentioned that after last year's show was rained out, everyone at SCABA was eagerly anticipating this year's show. "We've only had bad weather one year out of eight, so this year's show promises to be sunny and warm!"

All types of classic cars and trucks are welcome to enter the show, with just a small registration fee per vehicle (\$8 pre-registration; \$10 day of show). Trophies will be awarded in various classes, and door prizes will be given away throughout the day. The car show will feature a "bounce house" for kids, as well as a D.J. "spinning" classic '50s-'80s tunes, plus a "paint truck" for the kids to work on during the show. SCABA is also hoping to again offer a dog adoption exhibition sponsored by Minnehaha Animal Hospital, in partnership with Underdog Rescue, where people can meet dogs available to be adopted! 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Preparing your Home for Sale

Selling your home can be a daunting task. Where to start, what to do, whom to call? Read on, and this article will give you a good head start on your home-sale process.

The ultimate goal is to sell your home in the shortest amount of time, with the least amount of hassle to the seller, and for the largest net price. This is generally accomplished by prepping your home for sale so that it is in the best condition possible. Doing so helps ensure that potential buyers don't note flaws and start deducting money from their offer for repairs. If you don't prepare your home, buyers may not even consider or submit an offer, and instead move on to the next property.

To make your home shine, take on some of these easy tasks to present your home in the best light possible. Many of the most important home-prep tasks that homeowners can do themselves cost little, but require some time, dedication, and elbow grease. Fresh paint is relatively inexpensive and makes a dramatic, positive difference on a home. Neutralizing your home's interior and exterior color scheme ensures that it will appeal to the greatest number of buyers. Buy high-quality paints, as you get what you pay for. Currently, a gray color palette is popular in interior spaces. Repainting peeling or faded exterior paint will help your home present better and also allow the possibility of FHA- or VA-qualified buyers being able to purchase your home.

Make sure all projects have been completed. That piece of baseboard molding you've been meaning to install? Take care of this before your home goes on the market. Consider hiring a handyman for a day to tidy up some of those intended weekend projects, and just get them done. If you have hardwood flooring underneath your carpeting, consider removing the carpeting and having your floors refinished. Hardwood floors are very desirable among buyers, and refinishing can be done at a relatively low overall cost. If your budget allows and it makes economic sense, upgraded kitchens and baths with timeless finishes are still selling points and worthwhile improvements, as is a new roof and an updated HVAC and electrical system.

Once you have wrapped up your project list, consult with your real estate professional to see if your city requires a city inspection prior to going onto the marketplace. Homes in both Minneapolis and St. Paul proper require these inspections, as do a great many suburban cities now, to ensure building-code compliance and safety needs in housing are met.

Cleaning is of the utmost importance. Clean and organize everything. If possible, empty out cupboards, closets, the basement, and garage, and reorganize them with only the essential items. Make sure everything is put away neatly. Excess belongings can be put into an off-site storage unit, donated, or discarded. Deep clean your home. This means cleaning all surfaces, especially floors, windows, and all elements of the kitchen and baths. If this task is overwhelming, keep in mind that there are many professional cleaning services that can assist you in this endeavor. If you have pets, were or are a smoker, or your home has a musty basement, consider hiring an odor-remediation company to treat the home and neutralize these odors so they aren't a turn-off to buyers. Odor remediation companies often offer a guarantee, so if the odor returns, they'll retreat the area until odors go away.

Once your home is spotless from floor to ceiling and wall to window, it's time to depersonalize and stage your home. Put away family photos, collections, and valuables, and leave the essential furnishings that provide staging. Paint a picture of what each space should be used for. Your goal here is to show off the space and have buyers focusing on the house and picturing themselves in it, not looking at your family photos and feeling as though they're invading your home. Professional stagers often offer consultations on what to edit as well as room purposing, furniture placement, and accessory ideas. This service is often not very costly and well worthwhile for the insight it provides, which often helps a home sell faster.

To make your home inviting to potential buyers, make sure it has curb appeal. Ensure the exterior shows as nicely as the interior. Otherwise, it will not be *Continued on page 7*

Southside Sprint Bike Race Returns July 22

The Big Waters Classic brings the Midwest's best bike racers to south Minneapolis for the 8th consecutive year. "The Big Waters Classic is the most popular sanctioned amateur road race in MN," notes Big Waters Classic co-founder, Jason Lardy. "We're honored to have been named the MN State Criterium Championship for the 4th straight year. The state championship and the fantastic fan support from the Field Regina Northrop neighborhood will bring riders and fans from across the upper Midwest to our vibrant south Minneapolis neighborhood."

As in past years, family fun activities will keep fans engaged throughout the day. The Kids Activity Area gives kids a chance to make art with their race numbers, practice their sidewalk art skills and have their faces painted. The Athletes' Village brings racers and their team tents right into the middle of the action. Fans can get up close and personal with their favorite racers as they prepare for their state championship efforts.

One of the most popular spectator events in south Minneapolis, the 2017 Southside Sprint was the largest amateur road



bicycle race in Minnesota for the sixth consecutive year. More than 400 racers will showcase the speed and skill of US bike racing in front of 700+ spectators each day in the 2018 series. *

Thank you for this opportunity to update you on city and neighborhood issues.

Get ready for street sweeping

Starting April 24 for approximately four weeks, sweeping crews will take care of more than 1,000 miles of city streets in addition to sweeping alleys. To make sure the crews can do the most complete job possible, temporary "No Parking" signs will be posted at least 24 hours in advance to make sure streets are clear of parked vehicles. Drivers need to follow street-sweeping parking rules or they may have their cars ticketed and towed to the Minneapolis Impound Lot.

By the Friday before the first week of the sweep, you can visit <u>www.minneapolismn.</u> gov/publicworks/streetsweeping and click on "street sweeping schedule lookup" to find out when the sweeping crews are coming through your neighborhood.

City draft comprehensive plan

A draft of the City's comprehensive plan is now available for public input. The online plan, called Minneapolis 2040, is a draft framework of interdependent policies, topics, actions steps and maps intended to drive a citywide conversation about how Minneapolis will grow and change over the next two decades so that all residents can thrive. While still in the early stage, the goal is to provide a 20-year roadmap to change the course of existing disparities so that Minneapolis can become a city that works for everyone who lives here.

In the draft report, policies are organized under 14 goals adopted by the City Council in 2017, and also as 10 topic areas. Draft policies include:

- Increasing the supply and diversity of housing in all Minneapolis neighborhoods, including small-scale multi-family buildings.
- Committing to the production and preservation of affordable housing and to limiting housing displacement.
- Enhancing transportation options and reducing air pollution from transportation.
- Prohibiting new heavy industrial uses while preserving land for quality living-wage production and processing jobs.
- Supporting businesses by making it easier to have commercial uses near transit.
- Supporting entrepreneurship particularly in communities of color.
- Supporting the arts and creative economy.
- Supporting workers through living wages and workplace protections.
- Reducing greenhouse gas emissions through energy-efficient buildings.

This draft plan is the result of extensive civic engagement over a period of three years, involving residents, business owners, developers and just about anyone with an interest in the future of Minneapolis.

Public comment period

From March 22 through July 22, 2018, the City will be reaching out to the Minneapolis community to discuss this draft plan and to encourage review and feedback.

Comments will be collected at public meetings and online through July 22, 2018. That feedback will be taken into consideration as City staff revise the plan for City Council consideration. Comments can also be made at <u>minne-apolis2040.com</u> or shared on Twitter: #Mpls2040 @Mpls2040.

Welcome, Linkage Childcare Center

By Sue Filbin, Communications Committee The bright colors and the sound of children's laughter continue on the northeast corner of 47th and Chicago Avenue, but everything else has changed. In February 2018, Lisa O'Halloran took over the former Artisticrats space, renaming it Linkage Childcare Center (LCC).

O'Halloran, a metro-area computer science teacher, was "blown away" by the significance of the first five years of life on a child's development. She became certified in early-childhood development, hired talented staff, developed a partnership with nearby McRae Park, and cleaned and renovated the space in our neighborhood. There's new paint everywhere, floors were cleaned and buffed, new carpet was laid in the infant room, and new storage cabinets were installed.

In this language-immersion Spanish-curriculum childcare center, the term "Linkage" is part of the center's name to indicate the focus on building skills

with which students will "link" to their future. Students learn by engaging in "developmentally appropriate activities" through doing, discovering, and creating. All students learn social, behavioral, and emotional skills including manners, getting along with others, follow-through, making wise choices, independent play, and more.



Director Iris Mascio, M.S., noted the three age groups of children served by the childcare center: Infants, toddlers, and pre-school children. Perhaps most beneficial for the children are the ratios of children to adults. For infants, the ratio is 1:4; for toddlers 1:5 (state mandates are 1:7); and pre-schoolers 1:7, with state mandates at 1:10. Iris stated the progress a child makes with more attention from licensed teachers and assistants is "amazing."

Directions, lessons, and conversations are conducted by Spanish-speaking personnel. Gestures also show children what to do, ensuring that children who are unfamiliar with the Spanish language encounter no communication problems.

Iris, the mother of two pre-schoolers and two elementary students, grew up in Ohio where her mother was a pre-school director. After earning a B.A. in history and an M.A. in teaching, Iris taught secondary-school social studies as well as pre-kindergarten and toddler-level students. Iris' management experience at KinderCare led to her earning a food-management certification that she now uses every day when preparing a healthful breakfast, mid-morning snack, lunch, and mid-afternoon snack. She stated with pleasure that the kids say they "love Miss Iris' food." Iris stated that the trained staff at Linkage Childcare Center knows which milestones and expectations to watch for during a child's development. They also understand that for a parent, finding a safe childcare center is the most stressful part of parenthood. They have addressed those concerns by establishing a welcoming, stimulating, nurturing environment at Linkage Childcare Center. Several spaces for spring and summer are still available. *

Nokomis Healthy Seniors

Nokomis Healthy Seniors (NHS) has been serving our neighborhood seniors since 1994. NHS is currently operating Monday-Thursday from Bethel Lutheran Church located at 4120 17th Avenue South. The mission of NHS is to keep seniors healthy, vibrant, active, and in their homes by providing services, resources, and a community so they may continue to live independently and safely.

The program has a part-time paid staff of four, led by director Megan Elliasen. The

majority of the programming manpower is provided by volunteers; some 100 volunteers help make this program a success. Volunteers help with transportation (door-to-door rides to and from medical appointments, running errands, and grocery shopping), yard and home maintenance (spring and fall cleanup, general maintenance, and handyman services), and companion care services (regular visits and safety checks to aid in decreasing isolation), in addition to many social programs that volunteers assist with.

Bethel Lutheran Church serves as the social activities hub for the group. The church allows for easy accessibility and has several spaces that have worked well for social programming, including group exercise classes, movies (with seating from the old Guthrie Theater), arts programming, lectures, cards, games, and a monthly meal. A variety of monthly support groups are also hosted at the church.

Additionally, foot care and blood pressure clinics, along with other health programming, are held by NHS on a scheduled basis. NHS partners with Fairview Homecare Services. Through this partnership, NHS is able to provide some reduced-cost home-care services when coordinated through Nokomis Healthy Seniors.
